It is my pleasure to present the 2023 Hudson Fire Department (HFD) Annual Report. The HFD proudly provides fire and rescue services to the City of Hudson, Village of North Hudson, Town of Hudson, and the Town of Troy.

2023 was a historic year for the Hudson Fire Department. The Department celebrated 150 years of service to our community. After several costly fires, on April 3rd, 1873, the Hudson Fire Department was officially established. Every day since, its members have proudly served our communities. Several celebrations and recognitions were held throughout the year to commemorate this significant event. I truly appreciate every member that has been a part of this great department.

In addition to honoring the Department's past, the year 2023 saw the highest call volume in its history. The Department responded to 618 calls for service in 2023, a 20% increase over the past year. The call volume continues to increase as the Hudson area remains a highly attractive area for people to live, work, and visit. As we move forward, we need to start the discussion on the hiring of more full-time staff, especially in our Fire Inspection office.

Throughout the report you will see charts and graphs, facts and figures that tell the story of what our members have accomplished over the past year. But what you cannot put into a report is the dedication and time our members put in and the time spent away from their families.

We want to thank our citizens and local governments for their continued support. We are extremely fortunate to live and work in an area that shows great appreciation for the services we provide.












